

<u>March 10 – 15, 2013</u>

Honoring, and building upon, the foundation of the 1963 Birmingham Civil Rights Movement, the Step Forward Leadership Summit will provide 50 current and emerging leaders with learning experiences in community engagement and organizing, social advocacy and purpose-focused artistic creation.



The Step Forward Leadership Summit is a project of the Cultural Alliance of Greater Birmingham, with funding from The Kresge Foundation. Set for March 10 – 15, 2013, the Summit centers around the birthday of Birmingham Movement icon, the Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth, who would have been 91 on March 18.

Summit content addresses the citywide theme, "50 Years Forward," in commemoration of the Birmingham Movement's 50th anniversary and its pivotal role in American history. Just as Birmingham helped transform the world 50 years ago, the Summit seeks to encourage positive community transformation in 2013 and beyond.

The Summit is divided into two, two-day training workshops facilitated in partnership with Urban Bush Women (UBW), a dance company that uses movement methodology as a vehicle for teaching, organizing, communicating and promoting civic engagement and social justice. UBW will work in conjunction with People's Institute for Survival and Beyond (PISAB), an anti-racist organization dedicated to social transformation.

Step Forward participants who are chosen for the training can register for one of the 2-day intensives, Monday-Tuesday (March 11-12) or Wednesday-Thursday (March 13-14). There will also be an opening convening session on Sunday, March 10, for all participants and additional culminating experiences on Friday, March 15, that will be open to all participants as well as to the general public.

Summit Workshops and Classes:

Understanding & Undoing Racism/Community Organizing (PISAB)

This process challenges participants to analyze the structures of power and privilege that hinder social equity and prepares them to be effective organizers for justice.

Entering, Building & Exiting Community (UBW)

Through experiential learning, participants gain tools and methodologies for entering, building and exiting community, including navigating a variety of assumptions regarding community-based practices. This workshop is not a presentational how-to guide about community relations. It is a mapping of experience using tools that may include theater games, writing, and movement exercises.

Asset Mapping (UBW)

Participants learn a process that assesses and focuses on the resources, skills and strengths available within a group and/or community, not on what is needed or lacking.

Collaboration Lab

Participants explore ways in which artistic creation takes place from themes emerging from the group and/or community. Various artistic genres including creative writing, visual art, dance and song are used to process, synthesize and communicate. Collaboration Lab is an experiential example of leveraging the arts as a vehicle for social engagement.

Dance for Every Body (UBW/optional)

This movement class is designed for all, even those with no prior dance experience. This jam/dance class embraces the ideas that each individual has a unique and powerful contribution to make and that our bodies are a powerful source of agency. The goal is for "every body" to find their level of comfort and partake according to their abilities, and to appreciate the group's diversity as an attribute to their community.

The Step Forward Summit conveys a personal call to action and selflessness that echoes back 50 years to Rev. Shuttlesworth's persistent and consistent messages to both a local and national community of leaders, organizers and citizens of all ages. Its goal is to train today's transformational leaders who can inspire a renewed vision 50 years into the future, where the community steps forward together.
